Dear Community Residents,

A chill may be in the fall air, but our hearts are warm, and we welcome you to join us as we *Move Forward Together* to accomplish the work of the Plainview-Old Bethpage School District. The POB Hawks football team gave us an inspirational start to the school year with an amazing win for their season opener. I left that game feeling the promise

of a winning year for our students, staff and community, and each day I have had that feeling reinforced.

Accolades are already pouring in for members of the graduating class as they scurry to prepare their college applications. We have four National Merit semifinalists and 14 commended students. Seventeen students have submitted research papers for the Siemens competition, and 23 students are putting the final touches on their Intel submissions. Additionally, two of our students, Jackie Primack and Nicole Davidson, were among the elite Scholar-Artist Merit Award-winners recognized by Long Island Arts Alliance, and 17 students were selected to be All-State musicians.

During building tours with the Board of Education, we were all amazed at how quickly our students settled into their daily routine and began to work together as a team. There really is a great deal to be learned from kindergarteners. When we all focus our energies and work collaboratively, astounding things can happen.

We have completed our negotiations for the much-talked-about Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR) for teachers and principals and will most assuredly meet the deadline for submission to the State Education Department to avoid cuts in state aid. Negotiations with several units, including teachers, are about to wrap up, the results of which will shape our 2013-14 budget-planning process.

This year, the Board has identified goals to guide our efforts in maintaining Plainview-Old Bethpage as a premier district on Long Island:

- Maximize Student Performance
- **■** Safe School Climate
- **■** Enhanced Technology
- **■** Updated Facilities
- **Sound Financial Plan**
- **■** Improved Communicatiion

We have already begun to work on improving communication districtwide by encouraging community members to utilize social media and the district's website as communications platforms.

Our Board of Education will be hosting a series of community forums to gain further input from members of the community on how we will best meet our vision of a challenging, world-class education for each child in our schools.

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Implementing the Common Core Standards

Plainview-Old Bethpage is actively preparing for the transition to New York State's new Common Core Standards for all students K-12, which include enhancements to the ELA/literacy curriculum as well as to mathematics. The core curriculum changes, adopted by schools across the United States, are aimed at ensuring consistency in education from one grade to the next, as well as among all schools. These changes will be fully implemented in the nation's public schools in the 2012-13 school year.

Plainview-Old Bethpage has been focused on preparing students to become college and career ready. We are, therefore, aligning our resources and curriculum to make certain we are providing our students with high-quality instruction aligned to the Common Core standards.

In the 2011-2012 school year, the district began its work in analyzing students' literacy and math performance which is consistent with the Board of Education's 2011-2013 goals to maximize performance in all subject areas.

In support of this goal, the District is working with Schoolwide, Inc. to provide faculty with effective teaching tools. This year and last, Schoolwide consultants have been helping teachers work with *Writing Fundamentals*, currently being implemented K-8. Through support, presentations and workshops, the consultants are helping teachers jump-start the program in their classrooms. District-wide rubrics and writing expectations have been developed at all levels.

Fortunately, we have also appointed a permanent Mathematics Chairperson, Kimberly Ferina, to assist the district in advancing our students' performance. She hit the ground running by meeting with teachers across all grade levels and has begun her research in selecting instructional materials at the middle level that are aligned to the Common Core curriculum.

During Superintendent's Conference Day, teachers and administrators will continue to develop Common Core lessons which could be integrated across all disciplines. These plans will allow our students to engage in rigorous and challenging work which will also be reflected in the New York State's assessments, as well as our local measures.

What's Happening in Our Schools

One of the main priorities at the **Kindergarten**Center is to promote safety and to teach students how to appropriately participate in a learning community. Since the beginning of the school year, kindergarteners have learned how to be responsible in school. Thus far, the children have learned that it is important to follow directions, keep hands and feet safe and use kind words. Research shows a direct link between clear classroom expectations and academic performance and behavior. As part of the social and emotional literacy learning program, all students are acquiring selfmanagement and peer-interaction skills.





Students, parents, families, teachers and administrators gathered at **Old Bethpage Elementary School's** community-building movie night in September to celebrate the start of the school year. The meet and greet event showcased Dr. Seuss's *The Lorax* and introduced the new school librarian, Kyle Quenneville. Mr. Quenneville reminded all families of the importance of reading and encouraged parents to read along with their children.

Principal Ronelle Hershkowitz discussed bullying during the students' lunch hour at **Parkway Elementary School**. Ms. Hershkowitz emphasized the school's intolerance for physical, social and verbal bullying, while reinforcing that there *is* a proper way to handle a bully. Students learned that it is important for victims and witnesses to report bullying incidents and say something to a teacher or principal. The children were reminded to treat each other with respect and to be nice to one another.





As part of **Pasadena Elementary School's** character education program, students interpreted the code of conduct guidelines into poster art. The students' artwork will be displayed on the walls of the school as a reminder to make good choices and be conscientious of their classmates. The children collaborated to design posters that reflected their designated topic. First graders created posters about being courteous, polite and fair, while children in the second grade focused on the essence of the Golden Rule. Third graders designed art that depicted trustworthiness; fourth graders illustrated citizenship in their artwork.

The first graders in Dee Dee Edwards's music class learned the **Stratford Road Elementary School** song, "It's a Great Stratford Day." Written by former Stratford music teacher Rocco Del Greco, the song became the school's anthem when Stratford first opened in 1993. It is school tradition for each class of students to learn the song; the lyrics encourage children to work hard, make friends and enjoy every day at school. Sung at all school assemblies and concerts, the song promotes a positive school environment where children can learn and grow together.





In September, Mattlin Middle School sixth graders in Amanda Maltese's class read *Math Curse* by Jon Scieszka and Lane Smith and learned that math is involved in everything we do. Reading works of fiction and nonfiction in math class allows students of all learning rates and styles to understand that mathematics is important in everyday life. Upon finishing the book, the students conducted research to learn about the many ways in which math will factor into their future careers and adult life.

The Plainview-Old Bethpage Middle School's Advisory Program has gotten off to a great start this year. At the Mix-It Up Advisory Program event in October, students discussed the district's anti-bullying theme, Not in Our School. The advisory program gives middle schoolers an opportunity to make connections to other students in the building across all grade levels in a structured environment. The event allowed students to discuss the problems and solutions of being bullied.





In October, 224 high schoolers were inducted into the Plainview-Old Bethpage John F. Kennedy High School's DECA chapter. DECA is an international association of business students who partake in community service events and enter business competitions at the regional, state, and international levels. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors who were initiated into this organization heard a speech from Scott Strenger, a former POBJFKHS DECA vice president who placed second overall in the 2008 international competition. At the event, club officers discussed the outstanding achievements the group made last year and their plans for this school year. Congratulations to the students who were inducted; we wish them success in upcoming competitions!

POBJFKHS Artists Are Winners in Islandwide Competition

The Long Island Arts Alliance (LIAA) recognized three POBJFKHS students in the competitive Scholar-Artist program. Nicole Davidson (Music, Award of Merit), Adrian Kim (Visual Arts, Scholar-Artist Award) and Jacqueline Primack (Theater, Award of Merit) have represented the highest level of artistic excellence while maintaining unweighted grade point averages of 90 or above.

Nominated by teacher Warren Jacobson, Adrian Kim earned the LIAA's most prestigious award and was named one of 20 scholar-artist winners selected from 124 school districts across Nassau and Suffolk counties. She was one of two winners in the visual arts category and will be recognized for her talents by *Newsday* this January. Nicole Davidson and Jacqueline Primack received Scholar-Artist awards of merit and were among 20 students to earn this honor.
