POBJFKHS Senior One Step Closer to National Scholarship



The National Merit Scholarship Corporation recently announced the names of approximately 16,000 semifinalists in the annual National Merit Scholarship program. Among the names of the academically talented students was Plainview-Old Bethpage John F. Kennedy High School senior Kimia Ziadkhanpour. Kimia now has the opportunity to continue in the competition for one of the approximately 8,000 National Merit scholarships worth around \$35 million collectively. The winners of the scholarship will be announced next spring.

Launched in 1955, the National Merit program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarships. High school students enter the program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and by meeting participation requirements. Nearly 1.5 million students take the test every year; less than one percent of entrants win scholarships. Congratulations to Kimia Ziadkhanpour for earning the distinction of being named a semifinalist. We wish her great success as she moves forward in the competition.

Common Core: Focus on Math, Research and Technology

As our society becomes increasingly dependent on technology, it's critical that our students develop their knowledge and skill in math, research and technology. The Plainview-Old Bethpage School District is taking several actions to ensure that they do.

Math

Preparing our teachers to fully utilize the theories of Common Core mathematics is a primary goal of the District. To this end, POB will be working with Larry Farrell, an independent consultant from BOCES. Mr. Farrell will work directly with our teachers, as well as host seminars on progressive teaching methods. A primary focus of Mr. Farrell's work will be the Common Core's 8 Standards for Mathematical Practice (SMP). The SMP describes varieties of expertise that mathematics educators at all levels should seek to develop in their students. They place an emphasis on students doing mathematics and demonstrating learning.

A central component of the 8 Standards is the importance it places on real-world math applications. For example, under the old curriculum, a student might have been given an example of an equation representing the transitive property, and then asked to identity it as such. Under the Common Core, students are given one equation, and then tasked with finding its transitive equation and showing all work.

It's essential that parents have access to resources that will enable them to assist their children with math acquisition. To that end, POB is using several progressive technologies, including www.mathrightnow.com (for high school students), FASTT Math and www.IXL.com – an exciting program for building math skills through fun, challenging online exercises. Many students will now have access to **the complete** math curriculum from pre-K to Algebra 2, and parents can get detailed reports on their children's progress. IXL helps parents learn math functions and provides answers— an invaluable resource for assisting with school work.

Research and Technology

In Plainview-Old Bethpage, we *are* committed to preparing all of our students for future success by providing them with the foundation to pursue careers in emerging industries as well as traditional professions. We recognize, in this struggling economy, that there are still many professions that lack the skilled professionals to fill certain positions. Many are in the areas of health care, life sciences and engineering. Last year, POBJFKHS started a Health Related Career Academy in conjunction with the NSLIJ Health System. Students are exposed to the wide variety of professional avenues they can pursue as a possible job in the future. This year we will be developing an Engineering Career Academy through a partnership with Cameron Engineering, a local firm.

As we continue to update our curriculum, we will be integrating computer-aided drawing and design to our Middle School Technology courses. We have recently purchased 3D printers for use in each middle school and the high school, enabling students to generate 3-dimensional scaled models of their creations in our technology courses.

Research students who participated in summer internships or in-house research are actively working on reporting their findings for the Siemens competition and Intel student talent search and our underclassmen are beginning their background for the Toshiba and DuPont challenge. We have also embarked upon a K-12 research articulation plan that will enable us to identify and map out proficiencies at each grade level with specific research tasks occurring at various levels.

What's Happening in Our Schools

Learning Through Playtime at the K-Center

Teachers at the **Kindergarten Center** are making sure that children get the most out of playtime. That's because playtime at the K-Center revolves around structured activities that provide children with opportunities for creative play through free-choice centers. Children are given the choice of how to spend their playtime. Some activities include working in the art center, completing puzzles, playing cooperative games, using building blocks, or even role playing games such as a shopping list in the school's dramatic play center. These activities offer a fun diversion for children, while also reinforcing important developmental and social



skills. Structured play time can foster problem-solving skills, develop character traits such as patience and resilience, strengthen social and motor skills, improve linguistic competence and support children's cognitive and academic development.

A Day of Remembrance at Parkway

This past September, the nation paused to reflect on the 12-year anniversary of September, 11, 2001. It's one of the few moments when the whole of the country is unified in thought, even those citizens who weren't yet born when the terrible day



occurred. Students at **Parkway Elementary School** gathered on September 11 to honor the Plainview Fire and Police Departments, Veterans of American Wars, and Christopher Levi, a wounded warrior. It was a moving ceremony that reinforced character traits such as respect for others and civic duty. Legislator Judy Jacobs and Principal Ronelle Hershkowitz both spoke, and students placed small flags around the school's flagpole and presented the veterans with thankyou letters. "I'm overwhelmed at the number of firefighters, police and veterans here today, and by the presence of Chris Levi," Principal Hershkowitz said at the memorial, telling them, "words will never be enough to commend and thank you for putting your lives on the line for us."

Pasadena Students Improve Mental Math

Reflecting the shifts in mathematics as outlined in the Common Core curriculum, **Pasadena Elementary School** teachers have been using the Math Sprints program in the classroom. The Math Sprints program provides fun and quick activities that improve students' math fluency. This effective tool challenges students to develop math skills as it presents them with creative problem-solving tasks. The activities accommodate the learning styles and competence levels of individual students. Each grade completes different math sprints: first graders improve number sense and basic counting, and second graders focus on addition and subtraction with regrouping. The sprints become more sophisticated as children progress through the school year. A Love for Reading and Writing Is Cultivated at Stratford Road

Reading comprehension was the focus at **Stratford Road Elementary School** as the school year began. Teachers are using a structured reading program called The Daily 5, which helps students improve daily habits of reading, writing and working independently. During The Daily 5, children can work on one of five different areas: reading to themselves, reading to a friend, writing, focused listening and word work. Students can choose from any teacher-recommended book available in the school library. The Daily 5 is a versatile and important program; while students are working in groups or independently, teachers can pull a child aside for individual instruction. Many teachers have elected to utilize The Daily 5. By allotting a short amount of time each day to structured reading and writing, teachers at Stratford Road can help foster a lifetime of literacy.

OBES Students Apply Common Core Standards Through Art

Children in **Old Bethpage Elementary School** classrooms are participating in hands-on lessons that put the new Common Core Standards into practice, providing the opportunity for artistic expression. First and third grade social studies students read about natural landforms, including valleys, mountains, plateaus and plains, and then used clay or shaving cream to create models. Children in second and third grade held mock elections by creating campaign posters and voting with ballots. Fourth graders constructed cells using gelatin and common household items to identify vertebrates and invertebrates. These activities represent a great way to incorporate the Common Core Standards while allowing children to be creative and have fun.





Club Schedule Kicks Off at Mattlin

After-school clubs are an invaluable part of the public school experience. Clubs provide children with opportunities to cultivate individual interests, hone talents and develop meaningful friendships. **Mattlin Middle School** recently held its annual club fair to introduce students to the variety of clubs available to them. On September 24, over 400 Mattlin students gathered in the cafeteria to speak with club advisors and student members. Some of the clubs represented at the fair were the Grandpals, the Drama Club, the French Club and Kids in the Kitchen. The event was a great way to kick off another year of after-school enrichment for middle school students. All students are welcome to join one or more clubs.

New Students Feel Welcome at POBMS

The beginning of fifth grade is an intimidating time for students. In order to facilitate a comfortable transition during this phase, the staff at **Plainview-Old Bethpage Middle School** hosted a fifth grade orientation in late August. Fifth graders gathered in the school's gym, where they were separated into their new home-base classes. Each group was assigned an eighth grade MAP leadership student, who helped the new students generate a list of questions and concerns they had about middle school. Each group presented the questions to the assembly, and everyone discussed the issues together. One highlight of the orientation was a create-an-acronym contest, in which students selected five random letters and competed to see which group could come up with the best acronym. The orientation concluded with each group taking a tour of the



school with their MAP leaders, and it ended with a bagel breakfast in the cafeteria. The event was organized by staff members, guidance counselors, school administrators and fifth grade teachers. The orientation displayed the cooperative and inviting environment at POBMS, and made the challenging transition to middle school a little easier for the new students.

POBJFKHS Students Attend Business Boot Camp

When you think of boot camp, what comes to mind is probably soldiers crawling through the mud or climbing up a rope. Three students from Plainview-Old Bethpage JFK High School attended a boot camp this summer, though they had a


MUSIC AND ART NEWS
