Having never created a pop-up book, students relied on trial and error to engineer one that could withstand many reads. In addition to the engineering component, students' artistic abilities served to create a visually appealing text that evidenced their deep understanding of communities. Utilizing the writing process, students researched, drafted, revised, edited, illustrated, and published their first pop-up book! Who says that a Common Core activity cannot be fun?
