

Fostering a Culture of Care

Plainview-Old Bethpage continues to live its mission to create an environment where all students feel a sense of belonging by creating and engaging them in Culture of Care lessons. These lessons aim to develop culturally responsive students and are a proactive way to combat the rise in hate in schools.

Culture of Care is cultivated across a district when we involve all students, faculty and staff. During the first days of school, teachers did not jump into curriculum; rather, they engaged students in lessons about being kind, empathetic and civic-minded citizens. Students in kindergarten read "The Sneetches" by Dr. Seuss and created kindness trees. while POBJFKHS students analyzed the persuasive techniques used in public speeches that promoted both peace and hate. These lessons, coupled with the District's Social-Emotional Learning curriculum, all have school-home connection activities that invite families to participate in this work.

During Spirit Week, Culture



of Care lessons were led by classroom and English teachers. In the spring, the District will use its student civic ambassadors from Rho Kappa, the Social Studies Honor Society, to deliver more Culture of Care lessons to elementary students.

The Plainview-Old Bethpage School District is proud to be at the forefront of this vital curriculum development; and we are seeing the benefits in our classrooms, on our playgrounds and in the community. This work has spread to other Nassau County districts because of an initiative led by the Nassau County Council of School Superintendents' Curriculum Committee, where POB teachers worked alongside Nassau County teachers to create a catalog of Culture of Care lessons that address ignorance, bias, racism and hate, while encouraging civic empowerment.

Judy Jacobs-Parkway School

Fourth graders at Judy Jacobs-Parkway School immersed themselves in Native American history through a hands-on program, bringing traditional customs, storytelling and art to life. The students created Native American-inspired crafts, such as beadwork and pottery designs, and learned about the daily life of different tribes along with their cultural practices. The presenters explained the purposes of numerous artifacts that Native Americans used for hunting and gathering, and shared that above all else, a respectful, honorable relationship with nature was needed. Throughout the day's experiences and teachings, the students developed a deeper understanding and appreciation for Indigenous customs and cultures.

Ms. Trotta's third grade class visited Safety Town, a community-based program managed by the Nassau County Police Department at Eisenhower Park. Safety Town features a miniature town filled with small buildings, crosswalks, traffic lights and sidewalks, each of which allow children to practice real-life safety scenarios. Ms. Trotta's students learned how to follow traffic symbols and allow pedestrians to cross, giving them essential safety skills and awareness in a hands-on environment.

Pasadena School

Pasadena's third graders have been busy learning about the weather. Not only are they identifying different kinds of weather through their reading and science curriculums, but they also participated in the John Marshall Weather Assembly. John Marshall, whose



weather forecasts have been seen by millions of New Yorkers over the past 25 years, visited Pasadena School and included the students as an active part of "John's Weather Tour!" The mobile weather studio, also known as a green screen, allowed the students to read the weekly forecast, jump into a tornado, and discover different weather patterns and phenomena.

Following the assembly, teachers facilitated community circles with small groups of students to discuss the contents of the presentation through a prewritten script. The students from both schools left the day with an understanding of not only how to take a stand against bullying, but also how important, cared for and loved they are by their family, friends and school staff.

On Oct. 25th, the Senior Citizen Club held its annual Halloween Party at Jamaica Avenue School. The day began with opening remarks by

More than 150 attendees celebrated, many dressed in festive Halloween outfits, with three participants receiving prizes for the best costumes.

"The Senior Club is a group of 200 people ages 55 and up," Charletta said. "On Fridays during the school year, we go on various trips like golfing and fishing, and host parties such as our December holiday party." The club also has upcoming plans to see a Broadway show and a five-day visit to Washington, D.C.

"The club does some really wonderful things," she said. "Our events promote cognitive and social interaction and allow members to form relationships... and it's really beautiful to see these relationships forming."

Our Schools, Our Community, Our Future

The Plainview-Old Bethpage Central School District Board of Education has adopted a resolution to proceed with a community vote on Tuesday, January 14, 2025, on the financing of comprehensive capital improvements through a bond referendum.


"The proposed projects center on expanding building space for the steady increase in student enrollment the District has seen over the past several years,

as well as making needed basic infrastructure upgrades throughout the District," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Mary O'Meara. The proposed work aims to create larger instructional spaces, learning environments that support our comprehensive academic and extra curricular programs, air conditioning to cafeterias and gymnasiums in all seven school buildings, and infrastructure improvements outlined in the District's building condition survey report.

Residents will vote on two propositions:

- Proposition No. 1 funds projects across all schools, including an expansion of instructional and cafeteria space, new gym and cafeteria air conditioning, athletic field upgrades and a performing arts center. This \$99.5 million bond is estimated to cost the average taxpayer \$450 annually.
- Proposition No. 2 funds improvements at Jamaica Avenue to accommodate instructional use. This \$14.4 million proposal requires the passage of Proposition No. 1. If both propositions are approved, the estimated cost to the average taxpayer is \$549 annually.

The District will provide more information including a special bond newsletter to all residents. Important dates are listed to the right. The District looks forward to your participation throughout this process.
