Chloe Lee Named a 2025 Regeneron Science Talent Search Scholar Semifinalist

Plainview-Old Bethpage JFK High School senior Chloe Lee has been named a 2025 Regeneron Science Talent Search Scholar semifinalist for her project, "Exploring the Effects of Cannabidiol-Medium Triglyceride Oil on Locomotion and Tap Withdrawal Response Using Caenorhabditis elegans as a Model for Alzheimer's Disease." Chloe was selected as one of 300 students out of nearly 2,500 applicants from almost 800 high schools across the continental United States, American Samoa, Guam, Washington, D.C., Puerto Rico and 14 other countries.

Chloe conducted her behavioral science research project in-house under the direction of lead research coordinator Mr. Raymond Tesar and research lab facilitator Ms. Rohe Sheikh. Her project focused on finding a novel pharmacological treatment for Alzheimer's, the world's leading cause of dementia that impacts more than six million individuals in the U.S. alone.

Chloe's research offers the opportunity for advancements in the treatment of Alzheimer's, keeping in mind the goal of offering diverse and affordable options for all affected by this disease.

"Chloe is the epitome of what a



Regeneron STS Scholar should be," Mr. Tesar said. "She is one of the most well-rounded students I have ever worked with and has all the virtues of an excellent future leader in the scientific field."

"Chloe's success was made possible by the continued support of the Plainview-Old Bethpage Board of Education, Central Administration, and Plainview-Old Bethpage community at large," Mr. Tesar said.

The Regeneron Science Talent Search recognizes and empowers the most promising young scientists who are generating innovative solutions to solve significant global challenges through rigorous research and discoveries.

Chloe and POBJFKHS will each be awarded \$2,000 to celebrate Chloe's hard work and new discoveries.

POBJFKHS Seniors Named as Coca-Cola Scholar Finalist and Semifinalist

Plainview-Old Bethpage JFK High School students Jason Chen and Parshwa Shah were named as semifinalists for the 2025 Coca-Cola Scholars Program. They were selected as 2 of 1,366 semifinalists from over 105,000 applicants from across the country based on their academic excellence, leadership and service throughout their school and community.

Parshwa has also been named as 1 of the 250 regional finalists who will move on in the selection process by completing a 20-minute interview with the Coca-Cola Scholars Regional Interview Committee. Following these interviews, 150 students will be named Coca-Cola Scholars-select and receive a \$20,000 college scholarship.

POBMS Holds Annual Book Talk



POB Parents Participate in Mental Health Lunch and Learn

POB school psychologist and licensed clinical psychologist Dr. Jessica Macklin launched the monthly "Mental Health Lunch and Learn" three years ago to provide support for parents with children in the POB School District. These sessions aid parents with the emotional tools and education to assist their children who may be struggling with mental health issues. They also create a place where parents can connect with others who may be undergoing similar challenges.

Recent presentations led by Dr. Macklin include Social Media and Mental Health, Managing Anxiety, and Preventing Parental Burnout. Dr. Macklin will also often adjust topics based on what parents are asking to learn about.

"These sessions have been a place for parents to talk about struggles they are having either emotionally or challenges their children have had and how that impacts them," Dr. Macklin said. "It has been validating to talk about their own experiences and relate to others in the group who have been through similar issues."

Mental Health Committee

In January, members of the POB Mental Health Committee conducted walkthroughs of four District schools to assess how the physical environment in each school supports mental wellness for students and staff. Specifically, the committee sought to determine if the environment is welcoming (and how that is evidenced), how students seek help, whether signage supports mental health and wellness, and how students and staff communicate and interact. The next meeting will be dedicated to developing recommendations based on the observations and various perspectives of the committee.

Athletic Successes at POBJFKHS

The POBJFKHS athletic teams are having a successful winter season thus far.

Gymnasts Josophina Casvikes and Marisa Schlossman were named 2 of Newsday's top 10 Nassau gymnasts for the 2024-2025 winter season. Josophina made Nassau County's state tournament team in beam after earning a new personal best of 9.6, and Marisa recently earned her 3rd consecutive Nassau County Championship.

Winter track athlete Ethan Kaufman was named 1 of Newsday's top 25 winter track athletes and won the conference championship in the weight throw with a 61' 8 1/4" toss, making him the 5th ranked thrower in New York State.

Divers Justin Bocian and Joe Meder placed 2nd and 3rd at their division's meet with scores of 382.85 and 310.95. Swimmers Linus Lin set a new school record time of 54.43 in the 100 backstroke and Issac Chen in the 100 breaststroke with a time of 1:00.63, and both are state qualifiers. The swim 200 medley relay also qualified with a time of 1:39.97 with Linus, Issac, Kevin Hertel and Michael Lin.
