2020-2021 PROPOSED BUDGET

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR BOARD OF EDUCATION

Toward the end of winter, COVID-19, or coronavirus, changed our very way of life. Schools were closed, storefronts shutdown, and our brave medical professionals worked 24/7 to treat the ill. At the Plainview-Old Bethpage Central School District, we met this challenge head-on; our teachers, administrators, students and community pulled together to keep the educational journey moving forward. Students began their online learning experience, found ways to engage in community service and made new connections with the world. The coronavirus was an unprecedented world event, but the Plainview-Old Bethpage school community rose to the challenge of maintaining the standard of excellence through these difficult times.



The District's staff and the Board of Education continue to work tirelessly throughout the pandemic to keep our schools going. The District partnered with the community to propose a budget that improves upon the academic, enrichment, and social-emotional learning programs at Plainview-Old Bethpage, while recognizing the sudden shift in the economy and the pressure on your finances.

By drawing upon reserves, aggressively pursuing other sources of revenue, and putting tight controls on projected expenditures, the proposed budget carries a 1.16% increase over the current year's budget. The proposed tax levy increase is **1.98%**, which is **\$1.4** million below the District's allowable tax cap as set by the state. The budget proposal includes funding for:

- Teachers College Reading & Writing Program in grades K through 8
- Graduation pathways through CTE business management and entrepreneurship programs
- Strategic partnership with Northwell Health
- Coding program for grades 4 through 12

- Resources to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic
- Full implementation of 1:1 devices
- Compensatory special education services
- Expanded reading services
- Professional development for virtual learning
- Maintaining class sizes



PROPOSITION II: EXPENDING THE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND


In addition to voting on the 2020-2021 District budget, Plainview-Old Bethpage Central School District residents will be voting on the expenditure of the Capital Reserve Fund (CRF) for the District.

A CRF is essentially a savings account set up by the District to finance future building renovations and potential infrastructure needs. The District's CRF is being funded through Beechwood funds, other unanticipated revenues and unexpended funds previously accumulated. Approval of the proposed CRF expenditures will not impact the proposed budget.

The District is proposing expenditures not to exceed **\$3.8 million** to fund capital improvements to the facilities of the District.

PROPOSED CAPITAL RESERVE EXPENDITURES

- Athletic field improvements at POBMS (tennis and basketball court replacements and playspace improvements)
- Electrical system upgrades at POBJFKHS, POBMS and SR
- Fire alarm and emergency generator replacement at SR
- Districtwide parking lot, sidewalk, pavedspace and drainage reconstruction



WHAT'S ON THE BALLOT?

Proposition I: Annual School District BudgetAuthorization to spend up to **\$164,248,598** to support educational programs in the 2020-2021 school year.

Proposition II: Expending the Capital Reserve FundAuthorization to expend up to **\$3.8 million** from the Capital Reserve Fund with no increase to the proposed budget.

BOARD OF EDUCATION CANDIDATES

ELECTION OF TRUSTEES FOR THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected as trustees of the Board of Education for the three-year terms commencing July 1, 2020, and expiring on June 30, 2023. The one candidate receiving the third highest number of votes will immediately fill the unexpired vacant seat for the remainder of the term to expire June 30, 2021. You may vote for a separate write-in candidate for each vacancy. You may not write in the same candidate for more than one vacancy.

BUDGET VOTE INFORMATION Tuesday, June 9, 2020

All qualified voters of the Plainview-Old Bethpage Central School District will be sent an absentee ballot together with a postage-paid return envelope and instructions for completing the same. To be counted, all completed absentee ballots must be received in the Office of the District Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on June 9, 2020.

A qualified voter is a person who is a citizen of the United States, at least eighteen years of age, a resident of the District for at least 30 days prior to the date of the election, and who is not otherwise ineligible to vote under the provisions of section 5-106 of the Election Law (e.g. a person who has been adjudged to be mentally incompetent by a court).

In light of the limitations posed by COVID-19, there will be no in-person voter registration held at school district offices prior to the June 9, 2020 vote. If you are not currently registered to vote, registration with the County Board of Elections is available online through the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles website at https://dmv.ny.gov/more-info/electronic-voter-registration-application. Those wishing to register online must do so by May 26, 2020.

The U.S. Department of Justice has mandated that all public school districts in Nassau County and Suffolk County, to be in compliance with the Voting Rights Act of 1965, must produce board of trustee elections and school district budget vote documents in both English and Spanish.
